Uncle David's Dakota Dessert	Buttercup	90	3 - 4.5	5 - 6	Long vining habit; prolific fruit set; does not hold long in storage



These squash produced many immature squash and only a few mature fruit by the end of the growing season. Pollination and fruit set were also inconsistent.

Harvesting

Squash is ready to harvest when:

- Stems are dry and "corky,"
- Squash skin has toughened • A lot of rain is in the fall forecast

Curing

Johnny's Seeds recommends:

- Cure squash for 5-10 days at 80–85°F and 75–85% relative humidity
- Store it long-term in a cool, dry, wellventilated area.

Storage

Johnny's Seeds recommends:

- A temperature range of 50–55°F and 50–75% relative humidity is ideal.
- Storage potential for different varieties is two to six months and some storage time is necessary for some species to be palatable.
- Research in Western Oregon found that as long as storage was above freezing, a much wider range of temperatures and humidity was OK.
