## GOAL STATEMENT:

- 1. Provide a high quality multidisciplinary education in Northern Studies to students seeking a BA in NORS; to those who are taking NORS classes as part of another major; to students taking NORS classes for upper division credit; and to students who wish to satisfy their personal curiosity and interest in the North
- 2. Be at the forefront of research-based teaching on the circumpolar North
- 3. Provide an academic structure for learning about the Northern context for the entire university community through high quality teaching and innovative research and scholarship on the North

Students will have opportunities for experiential, applied, and other out-of-classroom learning, e.g. hands-on participation in research and scholarship, field trips, attending lectures and presentations by visiting scholars, interaction with NORS graduate students, and participation in NORS social and academic events.

Students will engage in a seminar experience near their final semester that will integrate all of their previous coursework on the North.

Senior seminar (capstone) course is required for graduation with a BA in NORS

Seminar paper (embedded assignment) to measure the integration of NORS coursework

- NORS 484W/O—Seminar in Northern Studies, the required capstone course
- Typically taken in senior year
- Seminar papers, with names redacted, will be evaluated at least annually by the NORS SLOA Committee

Students will explore original research, scholarship, and creative activity that focuses on the North through their interactions with NORS faculty, NORS-affiliated graduate students, visiting scholars hosted by NORS, and through presentations in the Northern Seminar Series.

NORS students are invited to attend Northern Seminar Series events. which are presentations by local and visiting scholars. NORS faculty offer community research presentations, quest lectures, readings, performances, papers, and art shows on campus and in the community. Grad students affiliated with NORS give open defenses and discuss their works-in-progress in open forums. NORS Alumni present formally and also offer informal opportunities for students to interact.

- The Northern Seminar Series offers presentations at least annually
- Art shows and readings are scheduled on an ad hoc basis
- NORS grad student defenses occur in batches in late spring and late fall
