Outcome Assessment for M.A. in Cross-Cultural Studies $2010\,$

The M.A. in Cross-Cultural Studies was approved by the UA Board of Regents in June, 2001 and the first students entered the program in the Fall semester, 2001, so we are completing the second five-year assessment cycle. Data is being assembled on an annual basis and is used to review the effectiveness of the program based on the following indicators.
