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Curricular changes resulting from conclusions drawn above

In Fall 2008 we began a new system that let the capstone project be either research oriented (PS499) or the completion of an internship (PS475) that also had reading and writing requirements.

We made these curricular changes (1) to keep current with the trend towards "hands-on" and service oriented learning in academics (2) in response to our majors who wanted to be able to pursue their own political science interests more closely (3) in realization that we needed a two-track option for students to better meet their post-graduation needs.

The Exit survey was heavily edited/rewritten for its administration this year. However, that did not enhance response rate. We now have a threefold plan to increase our exit mechanism for collecting information. We are designing three separate final survey tools. One to fit each potential capstone experience (1) Thesis PS499 (2) Service Learning PS475 (3) Legislative Internship in Juneau. We will also administer these surveys prior to the issuance of a grade for each course rather than wait until the student has actually graduated. Nearly all of our students complete these capstones in their final semester so we believe that with the appropriate survey language we can capture the vial information needed.
