RESULTS

Tracking Graduates and Alumni:




Figure 1. Results from survey of 13 of 21 BA graduates that responded to tracking survey during the review period.




Figure 2. Breakdown of job category of students entering fields directly related to their BA Geography degree, including those who entered graduate school.

Out of the 21 BA students graduated during the review period, we were able to track job placement for 13 of them (Figure 1 and Figure 2). We are working to increase the number of students that we are able to track through working directly with the Geoscience Department and utilizing the CNSM Facebook Page.

Of those 13:

- 7 are in fields directly related to their degree program including graduate school.
- 4 are employed in geospatial fields.
- 1 is employed in science education.
- · 2 entered graduate school in related field
- 3 are in non-related work
- 8 are employed in Alaska.

- A custom carpentry shop in California.
- A building contractor specializing in energy-efficient, environmentally responsible building in Alaska.
