

Student Learning Outcomes Assessment Summary

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1. Assessment information collected

- 1) Copies of the U.S. Department of Labor certificate of "Completion of Apprenticeship" is collected and recorded by the program advisor.
- 2) Transfer records from other colleges are recorded in the students file by the program advisor.
- 3) The program advisor and the student construct an educational plan that extends for the expected period of time that the student wishes to be enrolled. The plan is reviewed and revised if necessary, at least annually, by a meeting between the student and advisor.
- 4) To this date a biannual survey of graduates has not been done. A note is made in the students file if the student's post graduate activities are known.
- 5) The available student outcomes, 2010-11 and prior, from the English, Communications, Math, Psychology, and Sociology departments were reviewed.

Conclusions drawn from the information summarized above

- 1) 100% of the graduating students completed a U.S. Department of Labor Apprenticeship Program.
86% of the students enrolled in the AAS Apprenticeship Technologies Department are currently enrolled in a U.S. Department of Labor Apprenticeship Program.

- 2) All students are currently up to date with copies of transfer credits. The advisor's folders are up dated after the Registrar has approved the transfers.
- 3) Students and advisors usually meet each semester by phone to ensure that the student is on track and to make any changes necessary. This helps the student finish the program in the shortest time period.
- 4) 100% of the 2012 graduated students are working in their fields at least part time and enrolled in a four year degree program.
- 5) Previous student learning outcomes assessment summaries were written in various formats. It is presumed that courses taken and passed with a C grade or higher meet the University's requirements for an Associate of Applied Science Degree.

2. Curricular changes resulting from conclusions drawn above

No curricular changes were made as the results of this summary.

The last rewrite of the program was done four years ago. A meeting was held with representatives from the other two campus units (University of Alaska – Anchorage and the University of Alaska – Southeast) was held this fall. Using this and next year's summary, a program rewrite is due two years, using this summary.
