Japanese Phrases

Here are some Japanese phrases that you may find useful for the welcome ceremony and your self-introduction. (If you get stage fright and forget how to say them in Japanese, then saying them in English is better than saying nothing.) You will practice these during orientation.

**Your name: Watashi no namae wa desu. (My	name is)
OR Watashi wadesu. (I am) Example: Wata	ishi no namae
wa Matthew desu. Watashi wa Sarah desu.	
**Name of your host family: Example: Watashi no hosuto fa Kawasaki-san desu. (My host family is Kawasaki-san.) OR I wa Ito-san desu. Use the word "san" after their name (when using the first or last name) when talking to someone else or someone else: Miko-san, Hiro-san, Tanaka-san, etc. Do not using your own name, such as introducing yourself. **Your age: (the number in Japanese) sai desu. For example (15 years old)	e: juugo sai desu

Here are a few words and phrases you might hear in Japan:

Itadakimasu: Something you say before you eat.

Gochisosama deshita: Something you say after you eat.

Irrashaimase: A greeting you hear when entering a store or restaurant.

Sumimasen: Excuse me.

Gomen nasai: I'm very sorry.

Ohayo gozaimasu: Good Morning

Konnichiwa: Good day, hello

Douzo (also spelled Dozo): Please go ahead, please take some, you go first.

Arigato gozaimasu, Domo Arigato gozaimasu: Thank you.

Wakarimasu ka: Do you understand?

Wakarimasu: I understand.

Wakarimasen: I don't understand.

Chotto matte: Please wait a little bit.

Hayaku: Hurry.

Hai: Yes, I'm here (when calling roll), and also said when someone is listening on the phone to indicate they are still listening. Sometimes you will also hear someone make a sound something like the "N" sound to show they are paying attention.

Moshi moshi: Hello, when answering the phone.

Tadaima: I'm Home!

Honto: Really? Wow.

Sugoi: Amazing Wow.

Here are some English phrases you might hear in Japan: Nice to meet you.
