














Marla's Roundup

- 2. All record books must be turned in to the club leader by Sept. 10 so you can judge them using the appropriate rubric. Anything up for a merit award needs to be turned in to the office by Sept. 15.
- 3. All youth who sold a market animal need to turn their book in to the leader who then after scoring them and determining merit or not need their record book turned in to the office for verification by Sept. 15 or they cannot do a market project next year.
- 4. Achievement Night is Sept. 24 at 6 p.m. at Birch Hill Recreation Area. It is a potluck, so see inside for items to bring.

The next year is right behind it:

- 1. Turn in your annual financial summary report by Oct. 1.
- 2. If you are a leader, do your leader trainings.
- 3. National 4-H Week is Oct. 2-8, so be sure to wear 4-H apparel and promote 4-H.
- 4. Get set to have a great year!!!

Thank you all for all you do and for making our program the great one it is. We will be having a mandatory face-to-face leader training sometime this fall. I am looking at October or November. I will be sending out a Doodle poll to find a date. Please be on the lookout for this. Thank you!

Record Book Alert & Deadlines

Don't forget that all record books going up for judging to receive a merit award need to be turned into the office by Thursday, Sept. 15, at 5 p.m. You also need keep an eye on your mail for last year's club enrollment form for you to look over. Please pay attention and make sure everyone is on it and correct years are listed. If someone isn't on it that should be and you know they paid and have their receipt, then we can help with that. If they aren't, then they never got registered and need to this year. You will need to make any changes on the form and then return it to the office or your youth will not be receiving their awards. This is part of your responsibility as a leader.

The big day we are all looking forward to is **Achievement Night on Saturday, Sept. 24**. I am looking at doing it at the Birch Hill Recreation Area. We will do a potluck like we have done in the past. Clubs will need to sit together and we will have a club decorating contest. More information will be available as it becomes available and the theme is "Happily Ever After." I am looking forward to seeing you all there to honor the leaders and youth of the 4-H program!

Market Livestock Record Books for Youth and Leaders

Don't forget that all youth who sold an animal at the Market Livestock Auction need to submit their record books to their leader by their designated date. The leader will then judge them and pick out the ones they think are merit-worthy to be submitted for the final judging. The leader also needs to bring in all of the other books for verification to the Extension office.

Please understand that if a youth does not complete this step, then they are ineligible to participate in the Market Livestock Project next year. If you have any question, please call Marla.

Dean Watson is one determined go-getter! During barn set up this year at the Tanana Valley State Fair, it was suggested that a youth member should take on a leadership project and collect donations of wheelbarrows, push brooms and scoop shovels for the 4-H program. It was mentioned with the thought of doing this sometime next year, but Dean decided to give it a go this year.

These donations were not gathered for Dean or his club specifically, but for all of the 4-H participants to use as needed. All the youth made a big thank you poster for the donors and Dean returned to each donor with a thank you card and personal invitation to the buyers barbecue.

Completing the Annual Summary Financial Report

- 1. The Annual Summary Financial Report provides an overview of your club's financial activities for the 4-H year (October 1 to September 30). At the top of the form, fill in your club name, your bank's name, and the dates covered by the report.
- 2. Line 1, **The Balance at Beginning of Year**, is the amount on hand on the first day of the new 4-H year, or October 1.
- 3. Lines 2 through 6 are where you would report your club's **Income** for the year. Each line should report all the income from a particular activity or event. These should include gifts, donations, sales of goods, fundraisers, dues and/or fees, and other income i.e., grants. Items can be reported all together or separately, such as candy sales and car washes can be combined for fundraisers. For donations over \$5,000, indicate amount and name and mailing address of the individual or business.
- 4. Line 7, **Total Income for Year**, is lines 2 through 6 added together.
- 5. Line 8, **Adjusted Balance**, is your beginning balance (line 1) added to your total income for the year (line 7). This line shows how much money your club had to work with during the year.
- 6. Lines 9 through 14 are your club's **Expenditures** for the year, again grouped by a particular activity or event, i.e., scholarships, educational materials, activity costs/fees.
- 7. Line 15, **Total Expenditures for Year**, is lines 9 through 14 added together. This line will show how much money your club spent during the year.
- 8. Line 16, **Balance at End of Year**, is your total expenditures (line 15) subtracted from your adjusted balance (line 8). This line will show how much money your club has to start the new 4-H year.
- 9. Compare line 16 with your bank statement. They should be the same. If they are not the same it is probably because some checks and/or deposits have not yet cleared the bank. Use line 17 to add the total of all your checks that have not cleared the bank yet to your balance (line 16). Next, use line 18 to subtract the total of all your deposits that have not cleared the bank from your balance (right hand column in line 17). Write your new balance on line 19. The balance should now be the same as your bank statement. If it still doesn't add up, you need to go back and check all your income and expenditure amounts.
- 10. Finally, sign and date the report where it is indicated for the treasurer's signature. Also, have your adult leader sign the report and submit a copy to your club, a copy to your District Extension Office, and keep a copy for your records.






- Each youth featured in photo must be in <u>active</u> status in the ZSuite 4-H enrollment program.
