He also served ten years as an Alaska state senator and was chairman of the Resources Committee, chairman of the Joint Committee on Natural Gas Pipelines, co-chair of the Finance Committee and vice chair of the Labor and Commerce Committee. From April 2018 to April 2019, he was as the interim federal co-chair of the Denali Commission, which was established by U.S. Congress in 1998 to fund economic development and infrastructure in rural Alaska and serve as the lead agency to assist communities facing coastal erosion, flooding and permafrost degradation threats. Torgerson was nominated for the position by Alaska's congressional delegation and appointed by U.S. Commerce Secretary Wilbur Ross. Torgerson's long-lasting impact, while co-chairing the Senate Finance Committee in 2000, he authored and sponsored legislation creating the Technical Education Vocational Education Program.
