RAHI Students Make Good Choices

Students from the Rural Alaska Honors Institute (RAHI) made the choice this summer to go to college. They earned between seven and ten credits at UAF, giving them a headstart on college.

The University of Alaska Fairbanks Rural Alaska Honors Institute honored the accomplishments of 47 RAHI students at a graduation ceremony and a public reception.

Ed Alexander of Fort Yukon, a 1993-94 RAHI alumna, was the keynote speaker. Ed received his bachelor's degree from UAF in Interdisciplinary Studies and Secondary Education minoring in English and is now a high school humanities teacher in Arctic Village.

The RAHI program is aimed at rural and Alaska Native students who have completed their junior or senior year of high school with at least a 3.0 grade point average. Proposed in 1982 by the Alaska Federation of Natives and the University of Alaska, RAHI emphasizes a challenging university curriculum and a residential program to acquaint students with college life and expectations. More than 390 students, after participating in RAHI, have gone on to earn graduate (including medical doctor, pharmacy, and law degrees), baccalaureate, associate degrees, and certificates. Many RAHI alumni have

joined Alaska's professional workforce and many more are in the postsecondary pipeline.

"We attempt to build a supportive community in which students participate in a rich academic setting, build a university transcript, and develop a long-term supportive network with peers, staff and instructors," said **Denise Wartes**, program coordinator.

The RAHI 2008 curriculum included university courses funded in part by Alyeska Pipeline Service Company, Wells Fargo, the National Institutes of Health Alaska InBre program, UAF's College of Rural and Community Development, UAF's International Polar Year office, UAF Vice Chancellor of Advancement & Community Engagement, UAF's Northern Leadership Center, U.S. Department of Agriculture, EPSCoR program, and the LTER program. RAHI is sponsored by UAF's College of Rural and Community Development.

In addition to the academics involved with the program, students get to know each other through participation in events such as the Midnight Sun Run, Mosquito Meander, 4th of July picnic, Nenana whitewater rafting, movies, bowling, basketball, volleyball, ultimate Frisbee, Alaska Native dancing, swimming, and a recreational overnight outing at Bingle Memorial Camp at Harding Lake.

In addition, New York Life has expanded their donation to include three years of funding:


- to establish and maintain a RAHI advisory committee

Native Educator: Beverly Simon Kokrine

As the Native community experiences out-migration, a term to describe Alaska's rural population moving to hub cities like Fairbanks, this intensifies the need for strong Native role models for our urban children. Native teachers who reside in these hub cities play an important role; they bring culture, respect, and accomplishment into a westernized, citified atmosphere for the very group who need it most—children. This issue is twofold: we are minorities in Fairbanks, and minorities in the profession of teaching. The few who do teach in Fairbanks are valuable ambassadors for education and cultural representation; ultimately people we should support and respect.

Beverly Simon Kokrine ('85 Huslia) has been a teacher for 11 years with the Fairbanks North Star Borough School District. Her parents are Franklin and Lillian Simon, and she has four siblings: Eileen Jackson, Christopher Simon, Doreen David and Colleen Weter. She grew up in Huslia, Alaska, and emerged a professional along with several of her peers in a



single generation of amazing people. There are teachers, a superintendent, nurses, lawyers, a former Tanana Chiefs Conference President, and other leaders representing the Native community throughout Alaska.

As for **Beverly**, she taught 1st grade for three years at Nordale Elementary, one at Badger Elementary, and the last seven at Ticasuk Brown Elementary, teaching kindergarten—an age group she prefers. "It is the best job to have when you are raising a family. I have the same days off as my children. The summers off is the added bonus." Her children with **Curt Kokrine** are **Curt Joe**, **Clay**, daughter **Justin** "**JJ**," and **David**.

"They come in with such a sense of innocence." **Beverly** says of her students. She has a wonderful rapport with children that empower them to be independent in the classroom. "They absorb information so quickly" says **Beverly** of her students--you would be amazed by the sheer amount of small bodies all about their business. She instructs 13 in the morning, and 11 in the afternoon; they overlap for a time as morning students leave. **Beverly's** nature has everything to do with her ease in the classroom; she is naturally patient and calm. Add to this her great sense of humor that is always embracing the beauty of innocence in her students.

The paradox between her quiet skills and classroom management is probably most obvious in **Beverly's** petite frame—a hundred pounds sopping wet—and brings mirth to the classroom scene. Others would require a large physical presence! Not **Beverly**, she manages with technique, respect, and a love for her job.

Her method is to give students choices, showing students that their choices will lead to conclusions of their own making. It is a wonderful way of allowing children to realize the consequences of their choices, positive or negative, but in such a safe environment that rarely requires **Beverly's** discipline, instead she redirects in a subtle manner that allows each student to own up to their behavior. When someone is compelled to tattletale, **Beverly** says "I ask that the student give a 'good' report before they tattle. That means a compliment comes first."

She further emphasizes 'good' choices by complimenting a student out loud for others to hear; this serves as a reminder to peers that positive choices reap positive social benefits. It seems neither rhyme nor reason, but rarely do you find any needing correction, at least not in a distracting sort of fashion. Rather, these children are incredibly focused and making tiny accomplishments all day long.

A center-based classroom, each student begins the day by drawing a picture along with sentences to explain in a daily journal. From there, students have four choices in center activities, while she remains in the Writ-

ing Center, assisting in handwriting, comprehension, and often assessing a student's improvements along the way. While at phonetics, others weren't patient enough for one youngster to supply a sentence, "give him 'think time' please" Beverly pointed out, diminishing the chatter on either side of her.

Beverly has favorite students in mind over the years which have brought gigantic personalities into her classroom and offered up many imaginings for their lives as adults. "I asked students to complete a compliment to their moms for Mother's Day, one boy decided his mom 'was as beautiful as...a mowed lawn'! I laughed so hard and asked why he chose that comparison. He said his mom couldn't stop talking about their 'beautiful' lawn when it was mowed once the entire summer! We kept that statement the same since she would understand!"

Her mission is to establish positive parental involvement in a child's education from the beginning, in order to enhance their lifelong learning. To encourage interaction, parents are invited in for weekly cooking days referred to as Wonderful Wednesdays. "I want parents to feel like the classroom is theirs as much as mine."

An effective tool for communication includes a weekly parent notebook that **Beverly** sends home with each student, parents can write back after she shares the week. "Many parents write back with enthusiasm. The kindergarten year is so important to set a positive relationship between parents and the school." She wants parents to feel comfortable at the school while actively engaged in their child's development.

As for supporting emerging Native teachers, **Beverly** welcomes any Education 102 students who need their practicum hours for the University of Alaska Fairbanks. She wanted to become a teacher ever since **Dorothy Jordan** was her junior high teacher. "Seeing that positive role model in the community touched my life." **Bev** remembers **Dorothy** welcoming students into her house as soon as school was out for the day. "**Dorothy** didn't even get a break!"

Another Athabascan teacher had a positive influence on her life as well. **Lois Huntington** was an elementary teacher in Huslia when **Beverly** was a child. Situated on the Koyukuk River, Huslia is home to around

Beaver students return from 10-day school trip to Tokyo, Japan

During the 50th anniversary of his death, the life of legendary Japanese Alaska pioneer **Kyosuke "Frank" Yasuda** is being commemorated in both his birthplace in Japan and in Beaver, the Yukon River community he founded with his Inupiat wife **Nevelo** in 1910.

The first portion of the international celebration returned home Monday evening from a trip of a lifetime. Toting luggage filled with Japanese mementos, eight schoolchildren and five adult chaperones from the Athabascan village of Beaver wearily debarked at Fairbanks International Airport on their next-to-last stop on the voyage home.

A year of fundraising, gift-making, regalia-sewing and a semester and a half of Japanese lessons prepared the group for journey. But the excitement isn't done yet. The school trip was followed in August by a three-day potlatch in Beaver featuring 35 Japanese guests.

"We're so grateful to have gone," Beaver school Principal **Charleen Fisher-Salmon** (**'86 Beaver**) said. Last year, **Fisher-Salmon** won a Teacher Dream Challenge Grant from the Aurora Foundation in California, which paid her way. Elders and others in the village were already making plans for the commemorative potlatch when **Fisher-Salmon** won the grant, and it served as a stimulus for others to make a trip to Japan.

Then began a flurry of fundraisers — raffles, cakewalks and spaghetti feeds. Help came from the Beaver Village Council, the village corporation, and the Yukon-Koyukuk School District. When school started last fall, the K-12 students started taking Japanese lessons with a long-distance instructor and preparing gifts and regalia and practicing songs in the Native language. The work and preparation, included learning proper Japanese etiquette, was worth it. "They treated us so kindly," **Salmon-Fisher** said. "It was really exciting."

Ryo Satomi, a frequent visitor to Beaver the past 15 years, researched **Yasuda's** life and made all the contacts for the trip. Four days were spent participating in a multitude of planned activities in the seaside city of Ishinomaki (where **Yasuda** was born) and Sendai, both in Miyagi prefecture. The group cut the ribbon at a special **Yasuda** display at a university and viewed traditional dancing and drumming.

Other highlights of the trip were being greeted by the large Minato (Ishinomaki) Elementary School marching band, seeing cherry blossoms in bloom, participating in a Buddhist memorial ceremony for **Yasuda's** ancestors and meeting the Ainu — an indigenous Japanese people — the governor and mayor. Many of the city experiences, especially in Tokyo, were firsts for the village children — taking trains and subways and walking through crowded streets.

"We are so glad we could share some of our Athabascan language and culture," said **Paul Williams Jr.**, a language instructor for Beaver school, who enjoyed learning firsthand about Japanese culture and customs during the trip. "I liked seeing Tokyo, one of the huge cities of the world and all of the nice people."

Second-grader **Allison Fisher-Salmon**, 7, said she liked Japanese snacks and popsicles, and also Tokyo. "It had lots of fun stuff," she said.

Yasuda came north as a cabin boy to Capt. Frank Healy on the U.S. Revenue Cutter, "Bear," and took up residence in Barrow in 1893, where he eventually married. At the time, the whale population was nearly decimated by commercial whalers and the coastal people were hungry and suffering from disease brought by the newcomers. Yasuda later was called the "Japanese Moses" for leading his wife's people across the Brooks Range from the northern coast of Alaska to the Yukon River. The Yasudas partnered with gold miners in the Chandalar area and established Beaver in 1910 as a supply center to supply the new mines in the region.

Peace Corps Project

Hello olgeta, olsem wanum? (Hello everyone, how are you?)

Since then, I've now returned to Vanuatu. I returned to rain, rain, and more rain! I spent two weeks back in Tongariki and then I boarded that wonder that is the *M.V. Brooklyn* for a 10-hour trip back to Vila. I boarded at Tongariki at about 4:30 pm - we stopped at Buninga and Makira (Makira hemi tuff tumas!) and arrived in Vila about 2:30 am.

Because of a recent crime increase in Vila, and because all the crew of the *Brooklyn* are from Tongariki and I know all of them - I decided it was safer to spend the night on the ship with the crew and with Susie (a teacher from Lewaima who also rode in yesterday for a training here in Vila) rather than try and make my way to the hotel at 2:30 in the morning... a time when all public transport has closed for the night. I slept with Susie under a blanket of stars as we tried to ignore the fuel fumes and rubbish aromas...

Then at 6 o'clock this morning I caught a bus to the Hotel Formule, showered and wandered here to the Peace Corps Resource room - where I'm happily reaching out to all of you.

I have been serving in the Peace Corps for just about a year now. Ask any volunteer, and they'll tell you that in the Corps, no two days are the same, no two volunteer experiences are the same, and that the quality of your service can depend on the work you do, where you are placed at, the culture you're integrated into, and the people you meet.

A lot of people join the Peace Corps for a million different reasons – an altruistic nature, a desire to travel, to see new places, to experience something different somewhere else - somewhere new and foreign and exotic. Some volunteers want to break down barriers, some want to learn new skills, some want to learn about a new culture. Through being in the Peace Corps, wherever you are placed, you will learn new languages, you will become a better communicator, you will become more patient, you will become a fuller and more balanced you.

In the Peace Corps, like anywhere else, you will have your good days - maybe the best days of your life - and you'll have your bad days - those days where you have never felt more challenged by your



circumstances. Some projects are failures and others – well, maybe they're successes even if they aren't exactly what you thought they might be – but if they are successes – then they are more relevant and needed than what you first imagined the project to be.

With all of this said, let me tell you a little more about my personal experience. I'm Alaska Native and proud. I'm Lower Tanana Athabascan and my mother is from a small village in Alaska's Interior. Minto, Alaska has about 250 people, three churches, a store, a post office, a clinic, a K-12 school and a lodge that houses the tribal offices. Most people from Minto are proud of our songs and dances and culture. This is where I come from; Alaska is, and has been, and always will be my home.

But in the last year I have found a new home in the most unlikely of places. And the home has come with a new culture, a new language and new family members. In Vanuatu, they would say I have become "One Woman Shepards."

Erata Village is one of five small villages located on Tongariki Island. Tongariki is about 2 kilometers by 4 kilometers. The population of the island is about 350 people. There are 3 "stores," in which you can purchase kerosene, batteries, peanut butter, cigarettes, rice and sugar – and when the ship is running steadily you might be able to buy some cookies or other sweet snacks. There are 3 churches, a K-8th grade school, and a local clinic, but there is no post office or bank, and the only truck they ever had broke down in 1987. My father, visiting from Alaska, was the very first tourist in Tongariki – and so why would there be a lodge?

Both villages face similar challenges in terms of "development." Both suffer from brain drain and urban migration, and both suffer from unique geographical challenges and remoteness, and as such, suffer from high prices of fuel costs. Amongst all the differences in cultures, personalities, songs, dances, languages, and lifestyles, we, all of us in the world, can always find some common ground; find ways to better understand each other.

Tongariki is a small, small island in the South Pacific. It is part of an archipelago known as the Republic of Vanuatu, if you are in Alaska; just head south to Hawaii, and keep heading south. Indeed, many Vanuatu maps might not even include Tongariki on the map. You might just see a spattering of land masses known as the Shepards Islands groups. But from the top of Tongariki, you have a 360 degree view of Tongoa, Falea, Ewose, Epi, Emai, Pele, Nguna, Efate, Makira, Mataso, Amour, and Buninga Islands. These are the islands that make up Shefa Province. It's an amazing view, the deep rolling ocean blues, the shale grey of rock jutting out of the ocean, white sand beaches, the lush green foliage that provides bananas, mangoes, papayas, manioc, taro, yam, coconut and other local organic fruits and vegetables. The sea, too, yields its share of shellfish, fish, octopus and crab.

The people on Tongariki are generous, with a great capacity for laughter. They work hard to maintain their gardens, and are anxious for development. They absorb every magazine, newspaper, photos and articles sent from home. In many ways, the people from Tongariki are situated on a cusp of change. Maybe in the way Minto was situated 50 or 100 years ago.

Then, in Alaska, we had not yet come across statehood, the Alaska Native Land Claims Act, the discovery of oil, or the pipeline. Then, in Alaska, we weren't even really a part of the great nation that is America. Now in Vanuatu, we see the march of development: cell phone towers rising from the ground, the promise of running water and electricity, laptops and computers in schools.

But with development and globalization moving forward, Ni-Vanuatu people and communities are struggling mightily to strike a balance between new kinds of infrastructure and the changes to the homogeneous culture that has kept them strong for thousands of years.

But that is an internal struggle. In the mean time, they toil away in their gardens, or fishing, or in their work with the church or school or woman's club. They love to socialize and they love to hear about Alaska. Is it cold? The surprise washes across their face when I tell them it's colder than the inside of a refrigerator during certain months. Is it dark? Again, amazement at the fact that sometimes the sun refuses to set, and sometimes it refuses to rise.

If I take the effort to explain to them that my heritage is such that my mother's family was settled in long before the American government or the missionaries arrived – they find a certain kinship in my heritage. And if I tell them my father arrived in Alaska himself as a volunteer – they can understand the connection between that and my own ambiguous reasons for making the decision I did to serve in the Peace Corps.

In my work as a Community Health Facilitator I spend time helping to develop the health committee and the management of the local clinic. I also teach health classes in the school and make health education workshops throughout the island. Currently I'm working with other health volunteers to develop a survey for the Province that will give us some baseline data; data that will tell us where to expend our efforts and to help us measure our progress.

I have fundraisers with donated articles sent from home, pens and pencils, bubble gum, bras and kilots (underwear), t-shirts, skirts, markers and teaching supplies, earrings, necklaces, and nail polish. Locals tear through the sale goods like Christmas morning spending precious vatu for a chance at something new. The vatu (local currency) goes towards the repair of the dispensary and puts money into the hands of the health committee.

These projects are fulfilling, slow-going, challenging – its progress at the grassroots level. Sometimes, I don't know what I'm doing; and what I know then is that I'm working with the islanders to work our way through the challenges together in

order to "mekem rod blong yumi everiwan stret (to make the path ahead straight for everyone)".

A typical Peace Corps experience includes 3 months of pre-service training, in which you are introduced to place, culture, language and an outline of the work that is expected of you. As a volunteer, you alone are required to fill in the details of your work – incorporating Peace Corps goals, community needs, and your own aspirations. After pre-service training you swear-in as an official volunteer and you begin the next two years of your life.

I am midway through my two-year service now. And after a year, I find myself still grappling with the concept of "sustainable development," even though it's been a concept rural Alaska has been grappling with for ages now. And after a year, I find myself still coming to new understandings about the culture here in Vanuatu, in all of its nuances.

A year has passed by so quickly and yet there were days that passed by so slowly, even time had seemed to disappear into the deep abyss of the ocean. But even so, rural village Alaska, if not Peace Corps Vanuatu, has taught me that all things will come to pass in their own time. And, even if I am only a small speck on the wave of history, I will never undermine my own capability to make a positive impact on the lives of others. Even if it's only found

in the smile of my host mama, in the fact that my host brother washed his hands, or in the fact that you, the reader, has taken the time to appreciate the wondrous resources around you and the diversity of culture that's found in this world.



Just as I went through RAHI, I held the same mentality during college by putting school first. RAHI had a lot to do with my accomplishments. It was the beginning of a group of individuals with the idea of truth and knowledge, education and family, community, and culture. Not only did I hang out with my RAHI classmates, I grew with the individuals who believed in the idea of knowledge. Where would this idea take us?

Over the summer after my first year at UAF, I knew what would come of the idea. The idea of knowledge was broadcasted throughout the world. It was broadcasted as Traditional Knowledge of the Inuit. I had the opportunity to travel to Canada. My trip to Canada was through the Schools on Board program, which allowed me to travel with Traditional Knowledge of my people, the Inupiaq of Shishmaref. In that program there were Inuit students from Canada, Greenland, and Russia who all shared their Traditional Knowledge from their people. Traditional Knowledge cannot be put into words. However, Traditional Knowledge is the very life you live. All of the Inuit students connected without a hint of doubt. It was because we live through Traditional Knowledge that we were so easily related. The opportunity occurred only because of that idea, the idea of Traditional knowledge. I'm proud to say that my Traditional Knowledge took me places; I'm proud to say it is what guides me to this very day, a day in my second year at UAF.



During the 2008 RAHI summer program, I applied for a full scholarship to a nonprofit organization called *Students on Ice (SOI)* that has been leading expeditions to the Arctic and Antarctic since 2000. Only 75 students were picked from 10 different countries for the August 1-17 expedition.

It took me three weeks to apply because I was already extremely busy doing a research project and studying for finals at RAHI. It was a little nerve racking because I sent the application the day it was due and had to get all the way to Canada by the time they had made their selection. Fortunately, of the 12 people who received this scholarship from a grateful anonymous donor, I was one of them. I was the only Alaska representative and 1 of 12 U.S citizens.

This summer alone I traveled on 20 different flights. I did not find out about my acceptance until three weeks before hand. The problem was I was in Arizona without a passport! I live in Nome and that is where my social security card, and birth certificate were, which I needed to apply for the passport. But just my luck, I got my passport in less than two weeks.

I then flew back home to switch wardrobes from summery hot 115 degree weather for weather that would range from -10 to 10 degrees. I was very excited and I knew I was fortunate to have the opportunity to participate in this expedition.

Students On Ice is an award-winning organization offering unique educational expeditions to the Antarctic and the Arctic. They do their best to provide students, educators, and scientists from around the world with inspiring educational opportunities at the ends of Earth, and in doing so, help them foster a new understanding and respect for the planet. I had no idea that I would learn so much about the Arctic coming from Alaska.

I most definitely value my culture and land more than I ever have. SOI has most definitely changed my point of view of the planet and gave me the chance to meet many people around the world that also want to help sustain what the polar regions are now. Not many people realize that if the poles melt, there will be a 6 meter rise in water levels. People in the lower 48 who currently live in land will have waterfront houses by 2050 at the pace the ice is melting. But what is worse is my own town, Nome, will be underwater!

I plan to help take some sort of action to help slow the warming of the Earth but it can't happen all at once. It is all a step by step process and right now I am just working on finishing high school and choosing a future college. But currently I am getting the community aware of the issue so that hopefully action will be taken and would be awesome if it would happen statewide. 
