The purpose of the department and campus-wide curriculum committees is to scrutinize course change and new course applications to make sure that the quality of UAF education is not lowered as a result of the proposed change. Alaska has a serious problem with violence in communities throughout the state and Alaska Natives suffer from the highest rates of violence in the nation. Native women and children are most often the victims but men also suffer. There is a need for better understanding of this problem at both the graduate and undergraduate levels as we look at ways to better protect community residents and break the patterns of behavior that allow this to continue.

We realize this is a challenging subject to deal with in the classroom but it is one that must be addressed. Students in the Alaska Native Studies and Rural Development programs cannot expect to implement lasting change in their communities if they do not understand the dynamics of this problem. By offering this stacked course at the undergraduate and graduate levels we will provide students with an opportunity to learn about why this violence occurs and to examine ways of preventing it in the future. We currently have no course in either the ANS or RD programs that covers this subject matter and this new course will fill these important gaps in our curriculum.
