Course Description: Hist. 132X is an introduction to United States history from 1865 to almost present day. It is impossible to cover everything that happened in U.S. history in this time period in one short summer class! Consequently, Hist. 132X will address major political, economic, social, and intellectual developments, with occasional more in-depth examination of select topics in U.S. history.

Course Objectives: Students in Hist. 132X will learn how to think and write critically about the past. They will learn to assess historical narratives and primary sources. Specifically, students in Hist. 132X will learn about the historical development of the United States since 1865.

Required Reading: James West Davidson, et al. *U.S. A Narrative History, Volume 2, Since 1865, Eighth Edition.* (New York: McGraw Hill, 2018.)

Additional Reading: Primary source documents will be posted on Blackboard. Each week there will be a document discussion on Blackboard, as well as discussion of documents in class.

Blackboard: The Blackboard site (classes.alaska.edu) will be used extensively in this course. The syllabus, grades, handouts, assigned documents, timelines, lecture outlines and PowerPoint slides, as well as other class information, will be posted on Blackboard. Hist. 132X is a hybrid class in that in addition to our in-class meeting times, there will be additional on-line class materials, assignments, and discussions on Blackboard.

Exams: Exams will consist of multiple choice questions and short answer identification of terms. Exams will cover material from lectures, the textbook, assigned readings, videos, and in-class discussions. Exams will NOT be cumulative!

Attendance and Participation: Attendance will be taken regularly. Students are expected to attend class and participate in discussions. Because this class has limited meeting times, attendance is extremely important and consequently will constitute a large portion of the total grade value.

Course Policies:
