An examination of the complex social arrangements guiding individual behavior and common human concerns in contrasting cultural contexts.

D. Course Goals and Learning Objectives:

- This course is designed to provide you with an introduction to the field of anthropology, which
 we will use to investigate how people and societies around the world construct both
 individual and group identities.
- You will learn the importance and characteristics of culture from the perspective of anthropology, while also learning how individuals and cultures vary around the world.
- You will learn about diversity and cultural variation.
- You will learn anthropological concepts that you can apply to real-world experience to help you navigate the complex and ever-changing world we live in.
- You will also learn what an anthropologist does, what careers are available to anthropologists, and some of the research topics available for study, both in Alaska and around the world.

E. Methods of Instruction:

The synchronous part of the class, which will be held at the set time of 11 AM—1:30 PM, will
be primarily lecture and class discussion. The asynchronous part of the class, which will be
completed on the student's own time, with scheduled due dates, will consist of recorded
lectures, multimedia presentations, exercises, and online class discussion and posts. These
methods will be supported by required readings, open-book exams, quizzes and
assignments.



i. Exams (30% of final grade, 15% each)

- There will be 2 exams
 - Exam #1 = 15% of final grade—May 9
 - Exam #2 = 15% of final grade—May 15
- Missed exams will receive a grade of zero.
- No make-up exams will be given, except for emergency circumstances at the sole discretion of the instructor.
- The exam must be completed on the assigned day, <u>unless previous arrangements are</u> made with instructor.
- Once you begin the exam, you will have three hours to complete the exam. You will not
 be able to pause and come back to the exam at a later time. Therefore, ensure that
 you are in a location with adequate internet speed before you start the exam. If this is

Exam Content and Format

- Exams questions will be drawn from all material covered as part of this course.
- The exam may include the following types of questions: fill in the blank, multiple choice, matching, lists, true/false, compare and contrast, short essay.

ii. Reading Assignments: (40% total, 5% each)

- There will be 9 assignments total
 - Your highest 8 assignment scores will each count as 5% of your final grade
 - Your lowest score will be automatically dropped.

Assignment Content and Format

- Assignments will be completed through MindTap on Blackboard.
- Assignments are <u>due prior to the start of lecture (11:30 AM) on the assigned day.</u>
- Assignments will consist of questions and exercises related to the assigned reading.
- You will read the assigned chapter and complete all parts of the assignment.
- Assignments may have time limits and limits on the number of tries. When applicable, such restrictions will be stated in instructions to the assignment.



iii. Online Lecture Attendance and Participation: (10% total, 5% each)

- Attendance and participation are important components of this class.
- · Attendance will be taken at the start of class
- You are expected to attend and participate during all class meetings.
- Your participation includes completing all readings and assignments prior to class on the assigned day.
- Those missing more than 25 min. of a class period will be marked absent and will also lose participation credit for that day.

B. Participation:

Participation will make up 5% of your final grade. It will be calculated based on the percentage of class days you attend AND in which you participate, by responding to class polls, contributing to discussion through chat or by voice, etc.,

 - All 3 exercises will count toward your final grade, **no** scores will be dropped

- The assignments involve watching either videos or live streams. For the live streams, alternatives are available, but you must inform the instructor by the second day of class if watching a live stream is not possible with your available internet speed.

VI. Expectation of Student Effort

This is a condensed course, but you are still expected to cover the same material covered during the regular semester. You should expect to spend a significant portion of the next few weeks working on this course. Students should expect to spend 2.5 hours a day, from 11AM—1:30PM in online lecture and class discussion (May 4—May 15). You should also expect to spend another 2.5 hours per day working on the course on your own schedule (watching recorded lectures and videos, and completing course exercises and activities). You will also be expected to read approximately one chapter per day. The amount of time this will take will vary from person to person, but it will likely take you 2-3 hours to read a chapter. In addition to the expectations for May 4—May 15, you also have through May 22 to complete the three Online Exercises, listed above.

You will be expected to complete all assignments, exercises, and exams by their due dates and have all reading completed prior to the scheduled lecture on the day in which the reading is

assigned. There will not be additional reading due the day of exams.

Due to the fast pace of this course, it is important that you fall behind. Therefore, no extensions will be granted for due dates, except for emergency circumstances, at the sole discretion of the instructor.

Students are expected to maintain a working backup plan to be implemented in the event of a computer malfunction or an interruption of their normal Internet service during the course.
