Course Description: This course analyzes current events at the regional and global scale using the tools and insights of world regional geography. We will explore environmental, cultural, historical, social, demographic, economic, and political patterns and processes and seek to understand how these elements interact to influence local, regional, and global events. The goal is to understand how geographical factors shape the world we live in today.

Course Objectives:

- To be able to recognize the **patterns** of the world's physical and human geography.
- To understand the specific **processes** behind those patterns.
- To know the location and understand the significance of the world's most important **places**.
- To understand how **people** interact with their natural and manmade environments.
- To interrogate, analyze, and understand the world's most pressing geographic **problems**.
- To become **proficient** with basic geographic tools such as maps, media, and Google Earth.

Blackboard: Blackboard (classes.alaska.edu) is the homebase for the course. All of the course documents, lecture materials, KML files, study guides, and assignment descriptions are posted to Blackboard. I will also send announcements via Blackboard. You are required to complete reading quizzes on Blackboard. Most importantly, **Tuesday** and **Thursday** learning activities are found on Blackboard. Make sure you have a Blackboard account and access to this course's page as soon as possible.

Zoom Video Conference Code: This class is a hybrid course delivered via video conference twice a week. You will be required to tune in via a Zoom video conference at the assigned meeting time on **Mondays** and **Wednesdays**. You do not need any special hardware or software to join the video conference. Simply use the link provided by the instructor to open the video conference window. Google Earth Pro: We will be using Google Earth Pro throughout the semester to explore and analyze places, geographic features, and other geospatial data. You should download Google Earth Pro (<https://www.google.com/earth/desktop/>) to the computer you use to complete your coursework ASAP.

Assignments and Grading:

Reading Quizzes: You will answer a series of questions posted on Blackboard before each MW class. These questions will cover the assigned textbook readings. The reading quizzes are meant to encourage you to complete the assigned readings, reinforce critical concepts, and prepare you for in-class activities and discussions. **Reading quizzes are worth 10 points apiece for a total of 100, or 20% of your final grade).**

Learning Exercises: Tuesday and Thursday classes will be on Blackboard. They will build off of your textbook reading assignments, and will feature a host of active learning exercises. These exercises may include media analysis, Google Earth exercises, atlas exercises, case studies, and other activities designed to reinforce content and promote critical thinking. Note that you can miss one learning exercise module per unit. **Learning exercises are worth 15 points apiece for a total of 150, or 30% of your final grade.**

Current Events Review: You will complete a short research project on a geographically-relevant current event. As part of this project, you will describe and analyze the current event using geographically-appropriate language and analytical tools. You will also demonstrate your ability to find and critically evaluate sources. A full assignment description will be provided. **The current events review is worth 100 points, or 20% of your final grade.**

Exams: There will be two closed-book, closed-note exams taken in class. Exams will consist primarily of multiple choice, short answer, and map labeling questions. Exams will cover material found in your textbook, supplemental readings, and lecture. You will be given study guides well in advance of the exams. **Exams are worth 75 points apiece for a total of 150 (30% of your final grade).**
