# Syllabus WRTG 111X: Writing Across Contexts Summer 2021 Nancy James, Ph.D.

**Catalog Description of Class:** Written academic essays will be prepare students for the academic writing required in university classes. Strategies of audience analysis, visual images of graphs, and literary devices will help complete the understanding of the clear presentation of academic papers.

**Course Name**: Becoming a successful writer and communicator is the class goal. To achieve this, students will read and critique successful articles, as well as work on critical thinking skills. A study of rhetorical devices and strategies will assist students in creating, conducting, and communicating a research project. This project will then be communicated in an oral presentation.

Strategies of audience analysis, visual images of graphs, and literary devices will help complete the understanding of the clear presentation of narratives and research.

This class will be conducted with both synchronous meeting and asynchronous work. Online classes will be on Mondays and Wednesdays while face-to-face class meetings will happen on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

The more the student puts into the course, the higher the student's outcome competencies will be.

# **Course Requirements: Grading Assignments and Points**

- a. *Annotated Bibliography*: In that regard, student will write a 4 to 6 item annotated bibliography that relates to your selected research topic of interest. Some examples of the research topics and annotated bibliography will be discussed in the class. Your selected topic must be approved by the course Instructor. **Total point value 50.** .
- b. *Topic Selection and Survey*: Each student is required to select a research topic based on his or her interest in this course related to our subject of writing in the sciences. Each student will develop a selected research topic related survey instrument and conduct, as a minimum, a survey

of 5 people and then writes, as a minimum, a two-page report that interprets the survey results. **Total point value of 50.** 

c. *Research Project*: Write a minimum of 4-6 pages of research paper excluding the <u>title page</u> and reference page. The paper should be about 800 words. A rubric is posted in Blackboard in class for this paper. **Total point value of 200 points.** 

d. *Two Reader's Response papers*. Students will take the assigned readings and write a one-page response to the readings. **Total point value of 100 points.** 

**e.** *Discussion*: Participating in discussions is important for maximum learning. To get full credit for discussions, students should offer ideas regularly in the class discussions. **Total point value of 100 points.** 

**f.** *Oral Presentation*. The research project will be presented to the class in the form of an oral presentation. There is a rubric on Blackboard. **Total point value of 200 points.** 

**g.** *Journal.* Write two journal paragraphs as a way to finding a possible research paper topic. . **Total Point Value of 50 points.** 

h. Narrative Essay. Write an experience that student has had in the form of a narrative or story. **Total point value of 50 points.** 

*i.Draft Argumentative Essay.* Following the rubric in Blackboard, write a draft argumentative essay. **Total point value of 50 points.** 

**j.** *Final Argumentative essay.* Following the rubric in Blackboard, write the final argumentative essay making necessary changes. **Total point value of 100 points.** 

**k.** *Draft Research Project*: Write a minimum of 4-6 pages of research paper excluding the <u>title page</u> and reference page. The paper should be about 800 words. A rubric is posted in Blackboard in class for this paper. **Total point value of 50 points.**

May 19 Narrative Essay Due. In-class: Assignments explained. Peter Elbow Freewriting. Writing in active voice. Discuss Aristotle *Rhetoric* Book 1, Chapter 1.5 Eudaimonia Assignment: Blackboard discussion questions on possible writing topics. Readable writing by using active voice.

Write two journal paragraphs about a subject of your choice.

May 24. Journal entries due. Readable writing with sentence variety. What different perspective exists on your thesis or main topic? Study different types of formatting such as APA, MLA, and Turabian. What is the difference in inductive and deductive writing? Why is it important? Other topics covered include critical thinking and author's perspective, annotation, and journaling.

May 26. First Reader's Response Due. Possible topic selection Due. Use journal ideas with ideas on your topic and create our own individual research. Work in class with peers to share our writing and ideas.

Aristotle *Rhetoric* Book 1, Chapter 1.2-1.3, pg. 74-82. Write Second Reader's Response.

June 1. Second Reader's Response due. Work on thesis statements and complications to a thesis and see what ideas or solutions present themselves. In-class survey.

Assignment: Blackboard discussion questions.

Write out three possible thesis statements for argumentative essays.

June 3. Thesis statements Due. Looking at persuasive techniques in writing. Working on quoting, paraphrasing, and summarizing.

Assignment: Blackboard discussion questions.

Write draft of argumentative essay and bring to class.

June 8 Draft Argumentative Essays Due. Peer Review of essays. Critical thinking skills activities.

Assignment: Blackboard discussion questions.

Revise draft argumentative essays after professor and peer review.

June 10. Argumentative essay Due. Readable writing with sentence variety. What different perspective exists on your thesis or main topic? Choose final writing thesis that will guide the research. We will create a survey and an interview on the research topic.

Assignment: Blackboard discussion questions. Write draft research paper.

June 15 Bring draft research paper to class for peer review. We will add graphics and pictures. We will start putting the components of the paper together. Work in-class.
