## Director's Notes By Kavelina Torres

Waqaa (Hello),

I am Kavelina Torres of the Holy Cross Tribe. Daughter of Terry Anderson who is the daughter of the late Catherine Ann Green of Aniak, Alaska, who is the daughter of Massapokorluk of Piamiut. Daughter of the late Craig HF Anderson who is the son of the late Howard and Vermelle Anderson of Belleville, New Jersey. I wrote and directed *Tumyararq-qaa*: a script 10 years in the making from idea to script to this form you see on the sound stage.

It is fitting that *Tumyaraq-qaa* is the first Tuma Theatre in decades. *Tumyaraq-qaa* asks the question: "Is this the trail?" and in a more meta way: "Is this the way?"

"Tuma" means footprint. "Tumyaraq" means "it is being a trail" and with the enclitic "-qaa" it makes the word Tumyaraq-qaa a question. As we question our lives, if we are following the right trail, and our time spent on earth, I hope we can come together and laugh for this bit. I wish you to have many journeys together with friends and separately. I hope your trail is as clear as you wish it to be and as exciting as it is needed.

Tumyaraq-qaa is an Indigenous futurisms situation comedy that explores the link between land and Peoples. It signals that we (Indigenous Peoples) are here in the past, the present, and the future.

Re-opening Tuma Theatre with a futuristic play, is a bold decision for the Theatre and Film Department. Even bolder to produce a situational comedy! We came together eight months ago to take on this monumental task and our department, faculty, staff, community members, and students have been up to the task. It has been an amazing journey!

I am especially proud of the way the cast and I were able to collaborate with blocking and dialogue to further make this a community experience. With dancing and drumming, we took care to understand everyone's cultures, so you may see a mixture of dance and drums. Don't worry. It's past the year 2275.

Tumyaraq-qaa has seven Indigenous languages embedded in the script. This wouldn't be possible without our actors. Our actors come from many areas across Alaska and were happy to lend their knowledge of language, customs, and ways of dance. Many thanks to the cast and Lou Frenzl for the words and pronunciations.

The art work is also led by the community. Some of the art on stage comes from our cast, some from the RSS Gathering room in the Brooks Building, and some from generous donations from our communities in the borough.

Thanks to the UAF Facilities Service, the Power Station, and the UAF Rasmuson Library for allowing us to film our Earth City and World Leaders on location.

I am thankful for The Department of Alaska Native Studies and Rural Development for their generous time and donation. Thank you, Jessica, Tia, Cathy and all of those who helped.

I'd also like to thank my own Theatre and Film Department. You guys rock! Maya and her guidance and her FLPA F271: Film Set Production I class, Carrie and her input, Kade and his design skills, Alex and his building skills, and Stephanie and her skills in costume design and construction. And, of course, the volunteers without whom we would be still riding the elevator up to the ship. Thank you Rori, Michelle, Vengre, Kingston, and Zorissa. Special thanks to Flyn and Daisy! We went into filming with innocent eyes and completed the film clip portions with a complement of competent students. It was and is a joy to work with you!

Quyana, quyanapak, ana base, and hai (Thank you) for coming and please enjoy the show.

He's studied Film and Broadcast Journalism at UAF, directed a production of Rocky Horror Picture Show for Naked Stage Productions, has toured the state as an actor for The Winter Bear Project, spins fire with Fairbanks Fire & Flow, has been a board member of the Tanana Valley State Fair Association for the last three years, and runs his own burlesque troupe, Daddy D's Dirty Dancers. #### Debbie Mekiana: Dr. Yuungcarista, Medical Doctor

Debbie is Inupiag, and grew up in Anaktuvuk Pass. Her father was David Mekiana, Nunamiut from Anaktuvuk Pass. Her mother, Mary Mekiana, is a retired teacher and Post Master of Anaktuvuk Pass, from St. Paul, MN. She has 3 children, In'uli Toopetlook, Usisana Mekiana, & Ulgina Mekiana. She also has 3 dogs, Saffira, Chicken Wing, & Princess, and 1 gecko, Cookie. She also has a younger sister, Gladys Mekiana, who has 4 children. Debbie currently lives in Fairbanks, and returns home to Anaktuvuk Pass as much as possible. She loves a subsistence lifestyle- hunting, fishing, gathering; sewing & beading, camping & roadtrips, traveling- in state, out of state, and international. She is an Assistant Professor with Alaska Native Studies, with an educational background in psychology and education. She has taught in Anaktuvuk Pass, was the director of UAF Rural Student Services, and is now currently an Assistant Professor with the Department of Alaska Native Studies and Rural Development. Debbie is passionate about decolonizing education and now acting.





Too Ozhrii (Misty Nickoli): Ellalluk, Captain Social Justice has been a lifelong focus for Too Oozhrii (Misty) Nickoli. Additionally, her animated Indigenous storytelling and comedy are an integral part of her identity, the combination of which has led to Misty's passion for acting. Misty is Denaa (Koyukon Athabascan) from Ggał doh (Kaltag) and her paternal family line is Tsimpsian originating from Metlakatla. Misty's first official involvement in acting was in the 2016 Winter Bear Kuskokwim tour where she played the female lead. Shortly after she joined a small group of socially conscious thespians as a founding member of Breadcrumbs Theatre. The troupe focused on developing skills and sharing in both Playback Theater and Theater of the Oppressed. For the past five or so years Misty has been performing as her alter ego Grandma (a character beloved in Indigenous country) in short improv at gatherings, trainings and conferences.

Asikluk has a wife, three sons, and a tutik (grandson). The family speaks English, Iñupiatun, Norwegian, and Northern Sámi at home. He enjoys cross-country skiing, hiking, going out in his gayag, and camping. He is involved with research and committees throughout Alaska, nationally, and internationally. Asikłuk is the founder and leader of the Pavva Iñupiag Dancers of Fairbanks.




#### Donetta Tritt: Naaq, Navigator

Kavelina Torres (Assistant Professor of Indigenous Media) Writing with passion, power, and humor, the Yup'ik, Inupiag and Athabascan filmmaker and playwright, Kavelina Torres, arrived from the wild tundras of the north many moons ago. Having been released from the University of Alaska Fairbanks gasgig with an Indigenous Filmmaking Interdisciplinary Bachelor of Arts degree, they were written into the First Nations Longhouse at The University of British Columbia where they dreamed into fruition their Master of Fine Arts in Creative Writing. Kavelina is an Assistant Professor of Indigenous Media with classes in preproduction, performance, production (film and theatre), and writing for film and television with an emphasis on a decolonized classroom using Indigenous pedagogy. For fall 2023, Kavelina will teach ANS/FLPA F381 Indigenous World in Film, FLPA/ANS F161/361 Intro/Advanced Alaska Native Performance, and FLPA F460 Cross-cultural Filmmaking. Kavelina directed the 2023 Festival of Native Arts live streaming webcast seen on Facebook and YouTube. They are an alum of the Sundance Indigenous Film Program and the Alaska Native Playwrights Program. They wrote and directed a short film: Yugumalleg; the film aired on FNX and PBS. They are also produced in theatre, had a short stint as a news anchor, are published in prose, and were chosen as a January 2022 "must read" by https://www.tor.com/ with their short story Technician Qamaq North published in CAROUSEL at http://carouselmagazine.ca/c46-torres/. Kavelina continues to write and make film and theatre.

After a long meandering academic journey, Stephanie is a Senior graduating this spring with a double B.A. in Theatre Performance and Fine Art with Ceramics focus and a minor in Film. Gifted with a lifelong love of sewing from her first teacher of fiber arts, paternal grandmother Pearl Sandberg, Stephanie's been employed in the UAF Costume Shop for almost a decade, beginning as a student worker and eventually as Costume Shop manager in 2018. She was privileged to sew with a number of great costume designers over the years including Bethany Marx, Jerene Mosier, and with Amanda Casterline as First Hand on I, Pagliacci, for Fairbanks Opera in 2018. Stephanie began designing costumes in 2015 with Theatre UAF's production of Stop Kiss, and followed by FST's Titus Andronicus in 2016. Recently she was Costume Designer for Theatre UAF's Misanthrope in 2021 and Seminar in 2022. Tumyaraq-qaa is a profoundly important project for Stephanie with the thrilling challenge of envisioning the clothing style and function of the distant future through the lens of arctic Indigeneity because of both the personal connection it represents to Stephanie's ancestors of past and future but also because Stephanie loves science fiction. She's grateful for this opportunity to stretch in a new creative direction.

#### Spotlight on a few courses offered this fall for those investigating the Entertainment Industry:

#### FLPA F121 - 3 Credits (72818) Fundamentals of Acting
