




Well-Being

Governance is an everyday activity

- Honor our children we can do this through involving them in all that we do, from the youngest ages all the way through college
- **Recognition and partnership** [by the SOA and other governing bodies] of Indigenous peoples, Tribal Sovereignty, the long-term stewardship Indigenous peoples have engaged in for millennia. But we can't wait to act -> we need to continue to teach our children the important values that they need to grow and thrive. It's truly about the next seven generations.
- Continue to make space for learning to take place: to share, and learn from each other what is working in different communities. How did things get started?. Learning "in place" is powerful tool.
- Indigenous Research by Indigenous Researchers answering those questions that remain unanswered. Leaning on cultural strengths and values to guide us.
- Breaking down any silos that exist it's hard to address problems when we are looking at them through disparate lens. We need to bring people together, cross collaborative, and generate new ideas. Bring different programs together run by the tribe for innovative solutions. If something doesn't work, you "find a new eddy".

Alaska has received plaudits for its ability to get COVID-19 vaccines to its residents. Here's how the state is doing it.

Part of Alaska's success in vaccinating so many of its population is its ability to receive vaccine allocations from various sources, including the Indian Health Service (IHS), to account for Alaska's 229 sovereign tribes as well as its large veteran population. Per the state dashboard, a large amount of the vaccines have gone to Native American and Alaska Native residents.
