#### 5. Course Goals (general), and (see #6)

Improve the student's skills in managing rural construction projects and communications with rural stakeholders.

Understand the matrix controlling rural project success: cultural, economic, political, and regulatory. Understand the history and basic laws regarding Alaska Natives. Use of local labor. Training. Risk communication. Use of local experts. Local and traditional knowledge. Village infrastructure.

#### Class 4

Transportation and costs. Barges and aircraft and their limitations. Local equipment and material sources. Communications, medical care, animal protection.

Guest Lecturer: Rural Contractor. Quiz

#### Class 5

Review of rural projects by type and location. Discussion of what should and should not have been done. Review of project failures, maintenance and operations, financing.

Guest Lecturer: Denali Commission.

#### Class 6

Class Presentation of project communication plan.
