# PROGRAM IN GLOBAL STUDIES

# Minor Program

The minor in global studies is an interdisciplinary program whose purpose is to enhance students' understanding of issues resulting from an increasingly interdependent world. The global studies program provides students pursuing a bachelor's degree an opportunity to broaden their horizons beyond their chosen majors and achieve a more integrated vision of contemporary global problems, alternative conceptions of global society and relevant strategies for moving toward a more just and humane world order.

The program is designed to be flexible, allowing students, in consultation with their advisors, to select and an array of courses and co-curricular experiences that best complement their majors as well as their goals for their careers and/or post-baccalaureate education.

In addition, global studies students are encouraged to pursue opportunities for study abroad

and foreign language acquisition as part of their minor requirements. Working with their advisors and the UAF Office of International Programs, global studies students may discover ways to build on their UAF coursework and satisfy a significant portion of their Global Studies Minor requirements at a foreign college or university.

Students will have the opportunity to pursue a wider variety of courses of interest, thus making the Global Studies Minor Program more appealing. In addition, students will have a better opportunity to complete a minor in one semester abroad.

# JUSTIFICATION FOR ACTION REQUESTED

The purpose of the department and campus-wide curriculum committees is to scrutinize program/degree change applications to make sure that the quality of UAF education is not lowered as a result of the proposed change. As previously structured the minor proved to be difficult to complete without an advisor authorizing exceptions to the requirements for one of the four prescribed tracks. Problems included: unpredictable availability of classes resulting from schedule changes, course cancellations and restrictive course prerequisites. Furthermore, the system of four tracks limited students and put artificial limits on the intended breadth and cross-disciplinary nature of the minor. Global Studies advisors typically worked with students by approving petitions for numerous exceptions. The more flexible approach proposed above would make official what has been common practice within the program. The new lists of applicable classes also reflect the addition of new courses and faculty with relevant areas of specialization who have joined UAF since the program was originally designed. In addition, the stated encouragement of global studies students to pursue study abroad and foreign language acquisition are consistent with the intent of the minor and will better allow and motivate students to take advantage of existing and developing opportunities as UAF increases its contacts and agreements with foreign institutions.
