Each student has an individual educational plan, which is a critical means of tracking progress and a key part of the process of education in a rural-based learning environment. A student career portfolio demonstrates individual accomplishments and the achievement of specific goal-related skills and competencies. The student career portfolio is developed to meet program standards. A copy of the standards is available on request. Students entering any tribal management course should be familiar with word processing, spreadsheets, databases and the Internet. Each student, with the help of a faculty advisor, is required to organize a personal support team to include a tribal leader or community mentor. Students entering either the A.A.S. degree or certificate program should meet with a faculty advisor to discuss program content, requirements and planning.

Students perform specific tasks, learn basic management rationale and explore issues in tribal government. Each student has an individual educational plan, which is a critical means of tracking progress and a key part of the process of education in a rural-based learning environment. A student career portfolio demonstrates individual accomplishments and the achievement of specific goal-related skills and competencies. The student career portfolio is developed to meet program standards. A copy of the standards is available on request. The Tribal Management program provides students with fundamental knowledge of tribal governance and finance as well as hands-on education and training in subject areas important to tribal governments. Students work closely with their academic advisor to choose courses that target their employment based needs and are encouraged to specialize their education to a specific area of study, or can take courses from multiple areas of study. Students entering any tribal management course should be familiar with word processing, spreadsheets, databases and the Internet. JUSTIFICATION FOR ACTION REQUESTED

The purpose of the department and campus-wide curriculum committees is to scrutinize program/degree change applications to make sure that the quality of UAF education is not lowered as a result of the proposed change. The purpose of this change is to more accurately reflect how the degree is currently administered and to make clear the requirements of the Tribal Management Certificate as well as to make clear the pathway to further education and advancement to the Tribal Management A.A.S. degree.

Currently, students are required to take 12 credits in a category area, when in one case only 2 credits are specifically listed in the category area. This change simply reflects what is currently being accomplished through advisor memos.

The primary purpose of this change is to specifically list more of the courses that have been advisor approved in the past and that students are taking to complete their degree program. This change will also make it easier for general advisors and students to see clearly what is required in order for the student to graduate. Most courses that were dropped are not available by distance or have not been taken by students in the past 10-year period.

Titles of TM categories have also been updated to reflect modern terminology and employment opportunities within the tribal community (for example, the category Heath and Social/Human Services has been amended to Community Health and Wellness), and Tribal Transportation has been added.
