D. ESTIMATED IMPACT

WHAT IMPACT, IF ANY, WILL THIS HAVE ON BUDGET, FACILITIES/SPACE, FACULTY, ETC.

Overall, the effect of this proposal will be to significantly increase the political science contribution to NORS, and to make the political science offerings more efficient by drawing more students into the courses. There will be no immediate budget impact, because we do not need to hire new faculty to teach the courses in the concentration. All the courses have been approved and are taught on a regular schedule. A few of the courses have lower enrollments than needed to make them efficient uses of faculty resources. Putting them in this concentration (and advertising it not only on campus but nationally—through the PS department's contacts with other departments) likely will draw new students. There may be a slight demand on facilities/space as enrollment increases. However, an advantage of the proposal is that a number of the courses in the program—for example McBeath's Alaska politics course—have online sections and draw as many students from outside Fairbanks as they do on campus.

The primary impact of this proposal will be on the political science department, which supports the proposal strongly. The northern studies and history departments will be affected as well. They will see more students in NORS and History courses.

Three additional departments—Anthropology, Economics, and Rural Development—offer courses which we propose to be electives in the arctic policy concentration. They will be affected slightly, and we have notified them by e-mail that we are proposing this concentration.

F. IF MAJOR CHANGE - ASSESSMENT OF THE PROGRAM:

All the PS courses already have identified learning outcomes and are assessed by their students and instructors. The concentration will be evaluated by political science faculty and both northern studies and history faculty. The assessment means will include: 1) annual review of MA theses/projects in the arctic policy area by a panel of three PS/NORS/History faculty who did not sit on student committees; 2) after the concentration has been in existence for three years, a biennial review of the satisfaction of goals and objectives of the concentration; and 3) exit surveys of graduating students.

JUSTIFICATION FOR ACTION REQUESTED

The purpose of the department and campus-wide curriculum committees is to scrutinize program/degree change applications to make sure that the quality of UAF education is not lowered as a result of the proposed change. In fall 2010, the PS department proposed a new graduate program, a MA in Political Science, with two tracks: 1) arctic policy and 2) environmental policy and politics. The environmental track already existed as a concentration in NORS; the arctic policy track was new at the time. Although the CLA academic council approved the proposal, at that time it lacked support (a promise of TA lines) from the dean's office; too, the graduate curriculum council was not sympathetic to a new graduate degree program, and some members thought the UA Regents would withhold support from a social science degree. Political science faculty are aware that the fiscal environment for developing new graduate programs is not good; however, they strongly believe that the department has a larger contribution to make to the academic treatment of arctic governance, politics, and policy than it already has made. For this reason, the faculty seek to have the second track, developed in 2010, become a concentration in NORS. The NORS MA program is entering its third decade and has a good supply of students. Arctic policy fits well within the interdisciplinary themes of NORS, will add depth to the degree program, and make it more attractive nationally.
