The title "northern studies" is vague and does not clearly indicate that the program addresses the circumpolar north. For instance, within the United States, "southern studies" programs address the American south. Thus "northern studies" could be assumed to address the more northern states within the United States.

We have always addressed the Arctic, and with our new Arctic Policy concentration*, there is greater emphasis on the Arctic. We want to label our program as accurately and specifically as possible. When people search for educational programs that address the Arctic, we want our program to pop up. This new title will serve that purpose.
