None required. Recommended readings, including journal articles, will be distributed prior to class sessions via on-line resources or during class periods. These articles include reviews on research topics in veterinary medicine. Articles on the veterinary profession or examples of research conducted in different subspecialties of veterinary medicine.

4. Course Description:

"Veterinary Science: Research & Methods" will illustrate the role of research in furthering the practice of veterinary medicine by presenting a series of lectures from clinical and basic science investigators, faculty and staff who will describe important elements of the research process. The course will also describe possible career opportunities to students in animal health research.

5. Course Goals:

Overall Course Objectives:

- Orient DVM students to elements of the research process, particularly where veterinarians may be involved;
- Describe topical research investigations relevant to veterinary medicine;

- Outline the structure of clinical and basic science scientific publications pertinent to veterinary medicine, and provide a framework for critical analysis of published research:
- Illustrate research career opportunities for veterinarians and externship/summer employment opportunities in research for veterinary students, and provide network opportunities for students with research faculty.

6. Student Learning Outcomes:

At the end of this course students will be able to explain different areas of veterinary research. The students will furthermore be able to critically evaluate research articles in different areas of veterinary medicine. Finally the students will be able to locate primary research and review articles in specific areas of veterinary medicine.

7. Instructional Methods:

This course includes lectures constructed to challenge students to consider the depth and breadth offered by a DVM degree in the context of research applications. Lecturers include CSU, UAF and visiting faculty members involved in the research process, and students performing basic and clinical research as part of their training, as well as staff in IACUC and IRB protocols and research integrity. Faculty will be selected on the basis of their ability to communicate research topics to novices, and for their enthusiastic, dynamic presentation styles.

9. Course Policies:

Attendance:

Students are expected to attend all classes. Exams will draw on lecture material and students that do not attend class will likely not to do well in exams.
