The program

- In existence since 1982
- Program has not changed very much over the years
 - Honors Scholar 27 credits Honors classes + capstone project/thesis
 - O Honors Thesis Scholar 12 credits Honors classes + capstone project/thesis
 - (designed primarily for transfer students)
 - International exchange experience is encouraged
 - Service work has been expected for a few years, but is not truly required
- Most of the honors courses are in the Core
- Very few upper division courses
- Students create contracts with individual professors to increase the depth/breadth/rigor of other classes to create Honors-level work
- Capstone does not have to be in the major discipline.
 - With the express permission of both the major discipline advisor and the honors advisor, a capstone/thesis may count as meeting both the major requirement and the honors requirement.
