Statement of Candidature for President-Elect of UAF Faculty Senate

I am a Professor of Geological Engineering in the College of Engineering and Mines. I earned my Ph.D. in 1994 from the University of Minnesota. After 3 years of postdoc, 2 years as term faculty in Michigan Technological University and 2+ years in the industry, I joined University of Alaska Fairbanks in 2002 as an Assistant Professor. I was tenured and promoted as Associate Professor in 2007 and promoted to Full Professor in 2012. I teach both undergraduate and graduate level courses in Geological Engineering and my area of interest and proficiency is in the general area of Hydrology and Hydraulic Processes, which includes non-isothermal multiphase fluid flow and transport in porous media, characterization of georesources and subsurface hydraulic properties, numerical methods and artificial intelligence applications, remote sensing and geophysical methods. My research has been focused on hydraulic processes in terrestrial and nearshore coastal environments in cold climates. I serve as an Associate Editor/Editorial Board of 5 journals and was the guest editor of a special edition on erosion and landscape evolution in 2011-12. I usually review 5-6 manuscripts from various journals per year and serve/have served in leadership roles in professional societies that I am affiliated with. I have organized an international symposium in 2011 in Anchorage. I have continuous service record in various leadership capacities in the University and College committees in UAF.

I have accepted the candidacy for the Faculty Senate President-Elect for 2014-15 because I feel honored by multiple nominations from our current faculty senators and also I believe strongly that Faculty Senate leadership is critical in the shared governance structure of the university. Shared governance is three-pronged with the Faculty Alliance and its associated Faculty Senates, UA and its affiliated campus Administration and the Board of Regents.
