This lecture and discussion course is the second in the sequence. Students in this course will present regular progress reports, will develop or learn and use project management tools, and will submit (at least) one abstract to a regional or national meeting; by the completion of the course, each student will have made a significant advancement towards the completion of their capstone project. Open only to Honors students; required of all third-year (in spring) and fourth-year (in fall) Honors students. Can be repeated twice for credit.

Grading: 1 credit. Grades will be based on written work, oral presentations, and class participation (10%). Students will write monthly progress reports (3 @ 20%), and will write and submit
